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Introduction

The establishment of the concept of Tolerance as a lifestyle for Emirati youth, that are capable of building the future, is a strategic goal to the Ministry of Tolerance and Coexistence. Thus, the ministry executes several initiatives that reinforce these values through the youth population, and especially university students. These initiatives included a collaboration between the ministry and the universities to create Tolerance Clubs that aim to spread Tolerance and Human Fraternity in the university environment. To achieve this goal, universities are invited to create their own Tolerance Club, or rely on an existing club which aims at values related to tolerance, peace, diversity, inclusion, or other related concepts. The club will lead activities and initiatives that aim to spread awareness, and enrich students' mindsets and lifestyles with the required skills and qualities that embed values of tolerance and coexistence.

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Outcomes of the Tolerance Club:

- 1. Implementing activities that reinforce the concept of tolerance and human fraternity in the university
- 2. Participating in the contests offered within the Tolerance Clubs initiative.
- 3. Encouraging students to participate in the club's activities and events.
- Creating a future plan for the Tolerance Club initiatives and activities.







Tolerance Club Organization:

The following terms as optional; The ministry of Tolerance encourages universities to take part in this initiative in accordance to their policies and preferred approach.

- 1. A faculty member from the university to guide the club.
- 2. A minimum of 10 students in the managing roles of the club.
- 3. The membership to the Tolerance Club is open to all students in the university.



Role of the Ministry of Tolerance

The ministry will provide the members of the tolerance club with an orientation session that includes:

- 1. a. Introduction to tolerance and human fraternity in the UAE.
 - **b.** Presentation about the initiative of Tolerance Club.
- 2. Organize and manage the contests listed within the initiative
- 3. Follow-up and support Tolerance Clubs to evaluate activities and gather feedback for future improvement.









Tolerance Clubs Annual Forum

This event will be hosted by the Ministry of Tolerance annually closer to the end of the academic year. The event aims to honor the students for their achievements in the Tolerance Clubs, present the results of the contest, and hold an open-discussion for the Tolerance Clubs to exchange knowledge and experiences.



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General Participation Conditions



- · University Students may work together in groups of up to 3 members or submit entries as individuals (all categories)
- All entries should be submitted as per the requirements set for each category
- Student groups are allowed to submit a maximum of two entries per category, and a maximum of 4 entries in total
- An entry cannot have been submitted to any other contest or publication
- Content must be original, must comply with all local and national laws of the United Arab Emirates and must be culturally appropriate for the UAE. (The Ministry of Tolerance reserves the right to make this determination solely and finally)
- · All entries will be in both English and Arabic.
- Further details for project entries will be provided for each category.
- Entries will be judged by a panel, for each different category.

Ownership of the underlying intellectual property of the project remains with the entrant, with the following considerations:

- Entrants grant the Ministry of Tolerance the right to use their names, photographs, statements, quotes, testimonials, and contest submissions for advertising, publicity, and promotional purposes without notification or further compensation.
- The Ministry of Tolerance maintains the right to reproduce, reprint, distribute, perform, display, or exhibit the project for advertising, publicity, and promotional purposes on their website, at conferences, or at any other venues.
- Entrants agree to be bound by the official contest rules and decisions of the judges.

Additional rules specific to Short Films category:

- · Both aspiring filmmakers and professional filmmakers are welcome to submit short films on the topic of tolerance and coesxitense.
- Participation is open to individuals or teams. There is no requirement to attend the online workshops to enter.
- Workshops Attendance (Optional):
- Participants may choose to attend workshops organized by the Ministry of Tolerance to deepen their understanding of tolerance and conexistence, and to enhance their filmmaking skills.
- Participants who do not attend workshops may still submit their films by completing the online training modules offered by the Ministry of Tolerance. These modules provide essential guidance and thematic insights into tolerance and coexistence.
- Film Submission by Professionals: Professional filmmakers are invited to contribute their works. These films must align with the competition themes and adhere to all submission guidelines.
- Technical Requirements:
- Films must meet the following technical specifications for submission:
- English language short films must have Arabic subtitles. Arabic language short films must have English subtitles.
- Resolution: Minimum 1080p, with 4K resolution preferred for optimal quality.
- Duration: 5–3 minutes in length.
- Format: .mp4 or .mov
- File Naming Convention:
- University/Name_ProjectTitle.mp4/.mov
- Non-team members may appear as actors or subjects in the film
- Any individuals or locations featured must provide consent via a signed release form. This includes both people and property, ensuring ethical standards are met.

Additional rules specific to Game Development category:

- No coding background is required to participate.
- A basic background in using computers is preferred.
- Each group is recommended to have two laptops, with one laptop being mandatory.
- For members without laptops, iPads or devices with touch screens may be used as an alternative, although a laptop for each member is preferable.
- Submission Process: All game submissions must be uploaded to an itch.io jam page, which will be shared with participants beforehand.
- Playable Format: Submitted games must be playable directly on the website, using formats like WebGL or other web-compatible options.
- Engine Flexibility: While the course covers Construct 3 and Unity, participants may use any engine to develop their game.

Evidence and Possible Proofs: A list of tolerance activities on which the field of each activity is specified.
	5 points	The index is concerned with ensuring the participation of students from different fields, majors and interests, and that the participants in the Tolerance Club's activities are not only from a specific major or field. This criterion is measured by calculating the number of majors which students are specialized in and are participating in the activities. Evidence and possible evidence: a list of tolerance activities, with the majors and specializations of the participating students	
	Number of students from the	5 points	The index is concerned with the level of cooperation and collaboration between the university and the Ministry of Tolerance and Coexistence, and encouraging university students to participate in national and international events in the fields of tolerance. This criterion is measured by calculating the number of students participating in the activities of the Ministry of Tolerance and Coexistence. Evidence and Possible Proofs: List of students' attendances in the various activities of the Ministry of Tolerance and Coexistence.
	Number of staff and faculty participation in Tolerance Clubs activities	5 points	The index is concerned with achieving inclusivity and linking a bridge of communication between all groups within a university through activities that include the participation of faculty, staff, and administrative personnel in the activities of the Tolerance Club. This criterion is measured by calculating the number of members of the administrative and teaching staff participating in the club's activities. Evidence and Possible Proofs: A list of the Tolerance Club's activities, on which the participant is a student, employee or from another category.

	Number of students benefitting	5 points	The index is concerned with ensuring the expansion and spread of the activities of the Tolerance Club to cover the largest number of students at the university, so that the message of tolerance reaches the largest possible number of youth. This criterion is measured by calculating the number of students participating from the activities of the Tolerance Club. Evidence and Possible Proofs: A list of all students who benefited from tolerance activities during the academic year.
	Number of activities targeting community members	5 points	The index is concerned with achieving inclusivity and reaching out to the community through the activities of the Tolerance Club. This criterion is measured by calculating the number of descriptions of activities provided by the Tolerance Club that target members of society, with the identification of the target groups of society in each activity, such as children, women, workers, people of determination,etc& other Evidence and Possible Proofs: List of Tolerance Club Activities that involve community participation.
	Number of activities using unconventional approaches (traditional types of activity: presentations, lectures	5 points	The index is concerned with employing creativity and innovation in presenting activities in the Tolerance Club in order to make them more interesting and novel to attract the admiration of the students. This criterion is measured by providing descriptions of the activities offered by the Tolerance Club and identifying the unconventional and creative methods used in their implementation. Evidence and Possible Proofs: A list of Tolerance Club activities that use unconventional methods.

This criterion is measured through the feedback that the Tolerance Club receives from university students through questionnaires, interviews, or other methods. Evidence and Possible Proofs: Determine the measurement tool or tools used to measure awareness of the degree of awareness and analyze its results.
		10 points	The indicator is concerned with the quality and maturity of the design of Tolerance Clubs activities in the university environment, to include knowledge of the challenges faced by students at the university related to tolerance or intolerance, and their ability to implement mechanisms and strategies that aim to face these challenges. This criterion is measured by calculating the number of activities that have been designed based on knowledge and study of the existing challenges in the university environment and related issues, and have been implemented on the ground. Evidence and Possible Proofs: A list of Tolerance Club activities designed to solve the challenges and issues of intolerance at the university
	targeting community	10 points	The indicator is concerned with calculating the percentage of students interested in participating in the Tolerance Clubs activities out of the total number of university students. The indicator is measured by calculating the number of students participating in the activities of the Tolerance Club divided by the total number of university students. Evidence and possible evidence: A list of tolerance activities on which the number of students participating in each activity is specified and a document for calculating the participation rate to the total number of university students.
	Number of activities using unconventional approaches (traditional types of activity: presentations, lectures	10 points	The indicator is concerned with ensuring university students' satisfaction, interest and interaction with the activities implemented by the Tolerance Club at the university, and the degree to which they benefit from them. This indicator is measured through questionnaires, interviews, or other measurement tools. Evidence and Possible Proofs: Determine the measurement tool or tools used to measure the degree of student satisfaction and analyze its results.





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
